Academic Writing: From a paragraph to an extended essay

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A paragraph:

- A topic sentence and a controlling idea
- It is a complete sentence
- It has a subject, a verb and (usually) complement
- Supporting sentences
- Unity and Coherence (Source: Oshima & Hogue, 1981).

Example:

Gold, a precious metal, is prized for two important characteristics. First of all, gold has a lustrous beauty that is resistant to corrosion. For example, a Macedonian remain as untarnished today as it was minted twenty centuries ago. Another important of characteristic of gold is its utility in industry and science. The most recent application of gold is in astronauts' suits. In conclusion, gold is treasured not only for its beauty but also its utility. (Oshima & Hogue, 1981, pp: 1-2).

A simple essay

- An essay has three main parts:
- (a) An introductory paragraph
- (b) A body (two or more) paragraphs
- (c) A concluding paragraph (Hoge & Oshima, 1983, p.77).

An extended essay

- Assignment e.g. 3500 5000 words
- Mini Thesis e.g. Approx. 30.000 words (see Shafira, 2017)
- Thesis = an extended argument (see Kamler & Thomson, 2014).
- PhD thesis e.g. 100.000 words
- All of which have their own specific criteria:

Structure of thesis for Masters

- Introduction
- Literature Review
- Methodology
- Findings and discussions
- Conclusions and Recommendations (Safira, 2017; see also Blasig, 2017)
